<p>CHRIST</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Because Jesus' life, death and resurrection are unique and authoritative for Christians, one way of offering a faith statement is to tell the story of Jesus in your own words. How would you tell the story of Jesus? • What is the most important part of Jesus' story, in your opinion? Why? • How is Jesus with us now?
<p>PRAYER</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prayer is the word we use to describe human connection to God. • What is your relationship with God like when you are by yourself? • How does praying with the church community help you connect to God? • Music is a form of prayer. What hymns or songs connect you to God? • Meditation or silence can deeply connect us to God. Do you resonate with this? • Walking, running, swimming, spending time in nature, can all connect us to God. What is your experience?

(healing, hope in a hopeless situation, wholeness amid suffering, a presence of peace in the midst of war, an inspiration to help one another?) • In what ways does God call us/you to intervene in the suffering of the world? • What role does forgiveness play in your faith? (God's forgiveness, and/or us forgiving one another)
<p>A FAITHFUL RESPONSE</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What gives your life a sense of meaning and purpose? • What life events and/or people have most influenced how you see the world? • If you could pick three events that most influenced your faith journey, what would they be? • How do you hope to live differently because of your faith? • What doubts linger alongside faith (sometimes doubt is a faithful response, yes)?
<p>A GATHERED CHURCH</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The church exists for a reason: to be God's hands and feet in the world, to worship God, to pursue love and justice, to care for one another, and so much more • What inspires you about this church? • What are your experiences of your church? How have you participated in worship, friendships, and service at Kenilworth Union Church? • How do you hope to be active in this church (or other churches) in the future? Why might you come to church once you are an adult?

Faith Statements are Normal

A faith statement is an attempt to put into words our understanding of who God is and who we are in relation to God. Humans have been talking about God since the invention of language, and we have been writing faith statements since the invention of the written word. In the Christian tradition, this primarily means talking about God in and through the person and work of Jesus Christ. This means talking about the birth, life, teaching, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It can also mean talking about your experiences in Christian community – as a child, growing up, and in the ups and downs of life.

You could write a faith statement every year for the rest of your life, and you'd probably write something different every time. That's fine. That's human, actually. Your faith statement will be your own – a testimony to you as you are *now*, and a testimony to the way you know God *now*.

Your statement of faith is your way of talking about God.

- It can have a theme...
- it can have some questions...
- it can have some personal parts...
- it can be a letter to God...
- it can be a letter to yourself...
- it can be a poem...
- it can be a prayer to God, ending with "Amen"...

Be creative.
Be yourself.

(...and don't plagiarize. Please. Offer attribution for words that come from others. Faith statements can have quotes from those who inspire you!)

The first 3 statements are from history. They were written by groups of people, and are used in churches around the world. **The second 3 statements are from other youth.** These are only to get the juices flowing, to get your mind set on the wide variety of ways people have talked about God and their Christian faith over the last many hundreds of years.

<p><i>The Apostles Creed, Rome, written at least 1,400 years ago</i></p> <p>I believe in God, the Father Almighty, the Maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord: Who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried; He descended into hell. The third day He arose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and sits on the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead. I believe in the Holy Ghost; the holy catholic church; the communion of saints; the forgiveness of sins; the resurrection of the body; and the life everlasting.
